The backyard of Lathlain since the beginning...

Lathlain Park has been a cornerstone of Aussie rules football in Perth since its establishment in 1959. The stadium was originally constructed to serve as the home ground for the Perth Football Club. The club, founded in 1899, is one of the oldest and most storied teams in the WAFL. Over the decades, the club has experienced both triumphs and challenges, with Lathlain Park being the backdrop to many memorable moments in the club's history.

Today, the stadium not only hosts WAFL matches but also serves as the training ground for the AFL's West Coast Eagles and hosts game days for the Eagles Women's team, reflecting its ongoing significance in AFL.

Lathlain Park has served the Football and wider community well, but it has done its job and the old site doesn't have the basic needs of a modern club.





The Funding Gap

Down to the final minutes

The project has attracted funding contributions from a wide variety of sources, with the State Government currently being the largest contributor.

State Government - \$10 million

Town of Victoria Park - \$5 million

Commonwealth Government - \$4 million

West Coast Eagles Football Club - \$1 million

Western Australian Football Commission - \$200,000

Total - \$20.2 million

Unfortunately, due to construction industry pressures, the cost of achieving the project's vision has increased. The cost estimate of the project is now \$25.6 million leaving a shortfall of \$5.4 million.

Will a great community project fall by the wayside in the dying seconds?

Without support the additional financial burden can't sit on Victoria Park ratepayers and the project could fail.

This will mean;

- No regional football stadium
- A scaled back project that won't support the development of women's football
- Unsustainable Perth Metro zone with no pathways for junior clubs
- Lose of current funding streams that have a female dependency



The Project

The new facility would bring the stadium into line with the 2023 AFL venue guidelines as capable of hosting AFLW and AFL Pre-season competition matches.


The grandstand development will include;

- Women's changerooms
- Improved universal accessibility
- Multi-purpose community space
- Function facilities and members area
- Perth Demons Football Club administration

- Create a gender equitable high performance training facility that establishes a pathway from juniors to elite level
- Completes the last stage in the broader redevelopment of the Lathlain Park precinct
- Establishes a multipurpose community space for use by local groups
- Renews Western Australia's most patronised football facility
