This initiative contributed to improved relationships with and respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

How much did we do?

70 attendees

How well did we do it?

93% survey respondents said that it's important that it's happening in Vic Park.

91% said it helped them better understand the place and people where they live.

89% said it made them feel connected to a shared history/culture.

89% said it made them feel welcome and included.

89% said they gained a new insight or knowledge.

Who benefits?

- The Victoria Park community
- Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people in the Town of Victoria Park
- Visitors
- 25% of survey respondents were born overseas
- 15% were Aboriginal and/or
- Torres Strait Islander
- 11% were LGBTOIA+
- 8% live with a disability
- 8% speak a language other than English at home

Theory of Change: By providing the opportunity for people in the Town to learn more about Aboriginal people's history and experiences from their own perspectives we increase our community's understanding of how the past has affected the present and inspire conversations that build relationships and work towards reconciliation.
